The Madison Folk Music community lost a great friend with the sudden death of MadFolk's long-time past president, Mike Tuten, on August 14, 2018. Our thoughts go out to his wife Carol Huber, his daughters Katherin and Anne, grandchildren and other family. Mike headed the Madison Folk Music Society for a decade, bringing musicians from as far away as Australia and Tuvan throat singers from Mongolia to perform in Madison, adding his voice to

choirs and choruses, and in recent years hosting house concerts in his basement, a space he had lovingly redesigned for that purpose.

need only to have seen him in his pinkly dress as The Betty of the Oak Apple Morris Dancers, circling the Maypole at Picnic Point any of the last 30 or so May Days, rain or shine. The scoop neck of the dress revealed his hairy chest, and he was usually carrying a pink parasol in one hand, and a plate of homemade poppy-seed cookies – a druidic specialty purported to have fertility properties, in the other.

Mayday was by no means the only holiday Mike celebrated. His full white beard, rounded belly, and genuine good nature ensured that he was in great demand as jolly old Saint Nicholas at office parties, nursing homes, and day care centers. His red stocking cap could be spotted at any demonstration taking place on State Street or at the Capitol from Thanksgiving to Twelfth Night, and with the Solidarity Singers during the noon hour.

Mike was a hot-air balloon enthusiast, most often serving as a chaser, or crew chief, or serving as an official at competitions throughout the country. One of his most endear-

> ing roles was as caregiver for his beloved wife Carol Huber, who has for many suffered years from rheumatoid arthritis. They were both excellent cooks, and Mike had spent the summer rebuilding their kitchen for their convenience.

Mike's funeral August 20 at Blessed Sacrament Church was packed, including all members of the choir in which he sang. Balloonists, folk and Morris dancers, folk musicians, family and friends filled every pew and all available supplemental seating, with standing room only at the back. Attenders were encouraged to wear pink or a Hawaiian shirt in his honor, and many did. Many stories were told at the luncheon which followed, after which one can only imagine Mike ascending to the heavenly choir in the basket of a hot air balloon, wearing his pink dress with its hairy décolletage, with a red Santa Claus stocking cap, and waving a pink parasol. We will miss him.

## Life Is Good on the Open Road - trampled by turtles banjodad records - 2018

From the sound of Life Is Good on the Open Road, Dave Simonett must be feeling better. Last year saw the release of perfect record Furnace, a powerful meditation on love and loss in the wake of divorce, from his side project Dead Man Winter. It may have been therapy for him, a record so personal that he debated whether to release it, but it was my hands-down favorite record last year. One I almost didn't hear. I was at a Hiss Golden Messenger show in Ann Arbor when the folks I had been talking to all night mentioned Dead Man Winter, and told me to check out the new record, adding "it's the guy from Trampled by Turtles" as a selling point. My gut reaction was, "I don't like Trampled by Turtles" (irrationally based on the one time I saw them opening for the Bottle Rockets a loooong time ago, where their only fault may have been being between me and the Bottle Rockets). I did end up listening to Furnace once I got back home, and before I knew it had racked up enough listens on Spotify that Simonett may have actually made some money. So when Trampled by Turtles returned from hiatus with Open Road, I felt like I should probably give them a fair chance. As it turns out, it is possible I do like them.

It isn't a big jump from Furnace to the universal truth of "We All Get Lonely," the album's introspective second track. The first verse is all about moving on, "there was never any simple way to leave this behind. Never any words to say to speed up the time. Positive and moving t'ward a home we can't find. I never meant to make it any harder." The songs still hinge on Simonett's smart lyrics and addictive, yearning voice. The biggest and most obvious difference is that instead of drums and keyboards, the emphasis is on fiddle and banjo, and these instruments carry most every song. Ryan Young and Dave Carroll, respectively, are extraordinary musicians whether playing an aching ballad as they do here, or racing to the finish on one of the record's many up, up-tempo tracks. Most impressive is Young's ability to illustrate the songs with a slide of the bow. On frenetic opening track "Kelly's Bar," the line "a knife in the back" is animated with a slow, screeching, slash across the strings. Despite the levity of the music, it's another broken heart song, punctuated with rich, Dylan-worthy images, notably, "met a girl downtown and she was covered in lightning."

The record's lightest moment is the winking "I Went to Hollywood," the story of a Midwest boy who finds that California isn't like it is in the movies. The instantly familiar melody of "Right Back Where We Started" bears an unmissable similarity to Neil Young's "Love is a Rose." Despite the tune's ambling pace, (Ryan) Young throws in a few fancy fiddle flourishes. The well placed ballads, "I'm Not There Anymore," "Thank You John Steinbeck," and the title track, give you a chance to catch your breath, and, more importantly, a chance to really hear Eamonn McLain's cello. The relentlessly catchy "The Middle" is a highlight, buoyed by acrobatic fiddle, Erik Berry's mandolin, and harmony vocals. The record closes with the instrumental "Good Land," followed by the meditative "I Learn the Hard Way," which closes poignantly, "I know you can't save me, but I know that's all right." On second thought, Simonett may not be healed, but he's on the right track. And until he brings back Dead Man Winter, I can probably get by with the Turtles.
