After 56 years of performing around the world and writing and recording innumerable songs and recordings, Tom Paxton has found yet another outlet for his creativity; he has joined his friends and song-writing colleagues Jon Vezner and Don Henry—known collectively as The Don Juans—in a writing and performing experience calculatinto trouble.

Tom's career has taken him from his days as a drama student at The University of Oklahoma to thousands of concerts in a variety of venues—from coffee houses in Greenwich Village to The Albert Hall in London to Carnegie Hall in New York; from festivals in Hong Kong to Denmark, from Tokyo to Oslo. He has done over 50 concert tours of England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland and has recorded over 50 albums of his own songs. Recordings of his songs by other artists number in the hundreds and include artists such as Bob Dylan, Johnny Cash, Willie Nelson, Dolly Parton, Judy Collins, John Denver, Joan Baez and Peter, Paul & Mary, to name just a very few.

He began his performing career in Greenwich Village in 1960, coming in on weekends from Fort Dix, New Jersey, where he was toiling away in the Clerk Typist School. (He used his typewriter one day to compose his famous song for children, The Marvelous Toy, later a hit for The Chad Mitchell Trio and Peter, Paul & Mary). Upon his release

in several years playing in nowlegendary coffee houses like The Gaslight and befriending other singers like Dave Van Ronk (The Mayor of Macdougal Street), Bob Dylan, Phil Ochs and Eric Andersen.

His shows with The Don Juans have him on his toes, he says. "These guys are long-ball hitters and if I don't want to get smoked I'd better do a little rehearsing. I probably need to do that anyway," he says, laughing. "It certainly couldn't hurt."

Grammy award-winning songwriter, Nashville-based Jon Vezner is a tunesmith of rare sensitivity and dry wit. His cataloque of recorded songs, topped by the poignant "Where've You Been," reflects his straight-tothe-heart sensibility and emotional awareness. Vezner weaves the particulars of his own feelings with the lives of people he has known into universal themes that deeply touch listeners' emotions. Vezner was honored with a

Grammy for "Best Country Song" and the Nashville Songwriters Association "Song of the Year" in 1990, for "Where've You Been" — the true story of Vezner's grandparents — co-written with Don Henry, and recorded by Kathy Mattea

"Where've You Been" was also honored as "Song of the Year" by the Country Music Association (CMA) and the Academy of Country Music (ACM). Jon was also voted "Songwriter of the Year" by the Nashville Songwriters Association International. Born in Minnesota, Jon Vezner began his musical career as lead singer and bassist for various groups in high school, going on to earn a B.A. degree in music education and music theory at Minnesota Southwest State University in the mid '70s. Jon's catalogue of songs reads like a songbook itself, interpreted and recorded by some of the greats in the business such as Martina McBride, Reba McEntire, Faith Hill, Steve Wariner, The Wiggins, Clay Walker, Diamond Rio, BJ Thomas, Janis Ian, John Mellencamp, Nancy Griffith, Judy Collins, and Native American recording artist, Bill Miller, to name a few. Jon's production credits include artists such as Danny O'Keefe, Victoria Shaw, and singing legend Patti Page.

In Morgan Hill, California in the early '70s, records like "The Band" by The Band and "Honky Chateau" by Elton John prompted Don Henry to begin writing his own lyrics to Jim Croce melodies. Then he learned to play guitar with a Paul Simon songbook. After that it was an education in The Beatles, Cat Stevens, Harry Nilsson, Carole King, Cat Stevens, and Joni Mitchell. Then Randy Newman's 'Good

Old Boys' and 'Old Number One' by Guy Clark changed his life. In April of 1979, at 19, Don made his way to Nashville.

After spending 4 years as the tape copy/librarian for Tree Publishing Company, cataloging some of the best songs by some of the best songwriters in Nashville (Sonny Throckmorton, Bobby Braddock, Harlan Howard, and Curly Putman), Don's own songs started getting recorded and he was moved to full-time staff songwriter. Ray Charles, Conway Twitty, the Oak Ridge Boys, T.G. Sheppard, John Conlee and Kathy Mattea are just a few who recorded Don's songs during this period. In 1990, Don and Jon Vezner received song of the year awards for co-writing Mattea's critically acclaimed hit, "Where've You Been". Awards from the Grammys, as well as from the Academy of Country Music, the Country Music Association, and the Nashville Songwriters Association International culminated it "Where've You Been" becoming the first song ever to be so honored by all four organizations. In 1991 "Wild In The Backyard" was released on Sony/Epic Records. Billboard's Ken Schlager chose the debut album as one of 1991's Top Ten records, as did Larry McClain of BAM magazine. Rolling Stone liked it enough to profile Don in their "New Faces" column. Since, Don's songs have been recorded by Lonestar, Rosie Flores, The Thompson Brothers Band, Bryan White, and Blake Shelton. A 2001 release, "Flowers and Rockets", was followed quickly by "Live At The Bluebird Café". In 2013 Miranda Lambert had a hit with Don and Phillip Coleman's song "All Kinds Of Kinds". At Don's shows, you'll easily spot those who have yet to hear his songs. Upon first experiencing them, the listener is often moved to laughter or tears, sometimes both at the same time! ## Garnet Rogers Returns to the MadFolk Stage October 4

Longtime Mad Folk favorite Garnet Rogers will be back in town October 4 for a concert at the North Street Cabaret.

Rogers, a Canadian singer-songwriter, has been a fixture in the North American folk scene for four decades. Mad Folk has had him out many times, most recently in 2018 when he was touring with Scottish singer-songwriter Archie Fisher. You do not want to miss this show!

Rogers' rich baritone voice tells tales of nature, people, and the small victories of everyday life. He got his start singing with his older brother, Stan. As children, the two of them would practice their harmonies while listening to radio broadcasts from the Grand Ol' Opry. They began touring togéther full time when

Rogers has a large presence on stage — literally. He is nearly six-and-a-half feet, with a voice to match. He has incredible range, and thoughtful, dramatic phrasing to his songs. His music, like the man himself, is literate, passionate, highly sensitive, and deeply purpóseful. An optimist at heart, Rogers sings extraordinary songs about people who are not obvious heroes. As memorable as his songs, his over-the-top humor and lightning-quick wit moves his audience from tears to laughter and back again. He's also not shy about sprinkling in political commentary.

In addition to his 15+ albums, Rogers is a published author. He released his debut novel, *Night Drive*, which he draws from some of his personal experienc-Garnet was just out of high es, as it is about some of the food pantry.

## Ghosts - steve dawson 2024 - pravda records

Steve Dawson, the California born singer/songwriter who has called Chicago home for the last thirty some years is not to be confused with the Canadian born country musician Steve Dawson who now calls Nashville home. The former Dawson's impressive discography includes a half dozen records with his folk/country/pop band Dolly Varden, several collaborations, and six as a solo artist. He's also co-authored a book on songwriting titled "Take It to the Bridge: Unlocking the Great Songs Inside You." Meaning the guy definitely knows how to write a song. He also knows how to assemble a band, and on his most recent release Ghosts he taps the best of the Windy City's talent. His previous release 2021's At the Bottom of a Canyon in the Branches of a Tree was a true pandemic record, on which he played and sang almost all the parts. For Ghosts he recruited the hardest working (and best) rhythm section in town, John Abbey on bass and Gerald Dowd on drums. Alton Smith added all sorts of keys, Brian Wilkie played pedal steel, and several quests contributed transcendent backing vocals.

Perhaps the most poignant of these is Ingrid Graudins, who passed away unexpectedly earlier this year shortly after recording her vocals for the album's final track "Weather in the Desert." While the song's account of a friend's failed attempt to drink themselves to death is not biographical, the wistful chorus, "Sometimes I wish I could call you up, we could talk about your dogs and the weather in the desert," with her sweet voice joining Dawson's, is especially mov-

ing now. Despite its heavy subject matter, there is an airy brightness to "Weather." The gradual fade-out, with Dowd's drums the last thing you hear, seems as natural as a waning heartbeat. It's actually "A Mile South of Town" that delivers the biggest gut punch. The dying thoughts of a motorcyclist, who likely had one too many and finds himself lying in the middle of the road in the middle of bad year, may not be the most obvious lyrical terrain, but it illustrates the axiom that life is short all too well. It's true for both the narrator and the "sad mama deer staring at me staring back at her, panic in her eyes, she doesn't want to die." Snuggled in between these is an account of bad behavior which wonders "will I get what I deserve?" "When I Finally Let You Down" accepts the inevitability of reaching a point of no return, beginning with the ill-conceived New Year's resolution of "gonna keep drinking till I can hardly see, then I'm coming home to you." Smith's piano and Dowd's cymbal crashes are the perfect drinking

The record may end with a triptych of depression and disappointment, but there are moments of sunshine. Ghosts' opening track "Time to Let Some Light In" is one of them. Its turn-the-page mentality, i.e. "the past is gone," claims that since the future is unknown, things can get better. It's that uncertainty that makes the Bobby Mc-Gee paraphrase, "freedom is another word for scared to death," hit home. Just because the past is gone doesn't mean it can't be song fodder. "Oh, California," with accompanying vocals by the incomparable Nora O'Connor, looks back at his birth state, and how it haunts him still. The cringingly stereotypical, but real-life characters that populate "Leadville"— the racist bus driver, the born-again high school principal— are all too familiar. Luckily, the unintended lessons they taught, "made me promise myself I wouldn't turn out like them," were righteous ones. Brian Wilkie's joyful pedal steel and the persistent, infectious melody make "Leadville" the surprise highlight. A close second is the blue-eyed soul of "It Was a Mistake." The slow waltz features a horn section, with John Moore on trumpet and Chris Greene on sax, as well as a slide guitar solo from Dawson. Meanwhile, you'd be hard-pressed to find a more positive song than "I Am Glad to Be Alive." His Dolly Varden bandmate and life partner Diane Christiansen adds knowing vocals about finding happiness in the small things. Something like finding ten perfect songs on a record.

Playing both originals and covers, she brings a passionate dynamic to the stage, and with it.

a pinch of snarkiness and a dollop of dad jokes. Melissa is unlike any singer you have ever heard. Her unmistakable sound has been compared to performance legends Melissa Etheridge, Adele, Alanis Morrisette, Amy Winehouse, Lady Gaga, & Bishop Briggs. Brandon Beebe is a uniquely evocative and versatile singer/songwriter whose talents have brought him to festivals like South by Southwest and earned him a whopping 20 combined Best of Madison and Madison Area Music Association awards over the years.
