1-800-ON-HER-OWN follows groundbreaking indie musician/ feminist Ani DiFranco, founder of the first "woman-run non-corporatequeer-happy" label, Righteous Babe Records, on a wild road trip from her punk-folk past to her life today as an activist and rock star. Throughout, Ani remains resolutely true to herself, no matter the cost. This documentary will be coming to the Barrymore Theatre in Madison on October 8th. Ani DiFranco crashed onto the music scene in the early '90s, a thundering new voice in the cultural wilderness, unapologetically bisexual, political and feminist. She toured relentlessly, thrashing out hundreds of frenzied shows that were part mosh pit, part hootenanny and part full-on tent revival, then selling cassette tapes from the trunk of her car to make it to the next gig. Ani became a worldwide phenomenon when she beat the male-dominated music industry at its own game by founding Righteous Babe Records, still going strong after nearly 35 years. The press called her "an entrepreneurial wonder" and "the industry's worst nightmare." Prince

called her "my hero." Ani simply called herself a folk singer, dedicated to art, activism and staying true to herself. 1-800-ON-HER-OWN takes us on a wild cinematic road trip, from DiFranco's punkfolk past to her life today as she reinvents herself as a passionate activist and revered rock star. Throughout the ride, she's brutally honest, famously foul-mouthed and totally hilarious. Her daily challenges resonate as we reveal both an enduring, inspiring musical icon and a very relatable contemporary "every woman" with her own epic fails and hard-won victories.

"This could quite possibly be one of the best artist docs I've ever run across."

# Universal Fire - jeffrey foucault 2024 - fluff & gravy records

You don't have to be a regular reader of Jeffrey Foucault's eloquent e-mail missives of the last several years to know that the loss of his friend and drummer Billy Conway in 2021 hit him hard, it's a theme that runs through his new release Universal Fire. Coming six years after his last studio record, Blood Brothers, Foucault explains that Fire took so long because after Conway was diagnosed with cancer, "I didn't want to make an album without him, and first he wasn't ready, and then he couldn't. Then he was gone." Conway was best known as the drummer for Morphine, but he also backed Chris Smither and Foucault's wife Kris Delmhorst, who he also produced two records for. Given the emotions running through these songs, sitting behind the drum kit for this record had to be an intimidating prospect. Luckily, Calexico's John Convertino was up to the challenge. He's a subtle, intuitive drummer, one of those who makes the most complicated rhythms look easy. He absolutely nails this record, but he didn't do it alone. There was an incredibly talented band that backed Foucault live in the studio: Erik Koskinen on guitar, Jeremy Moses Curtis on bass, the incomparable Eric Heywood on pedal steel, and Mike Lewis on keyboards and sax.

The emptiness is felt most profoundly on the somber opening track "Winter Count," which is less about grief and more a combination of disbelief and wonder. "It's funny how you left the party early, that never happened even one time in your life,"

he sings wistfully over gently strummed acoustic guitar and a barely there piano. There's also a hint of hope, "I don't think you've gone too far away, but I miss you every time I say your name." "Solo Modelo" reflects on touring alone after a decade as a duo, now one where there used to be two. "Solo gas station, solo café, so low I've been crying since you went away," the homophone of solo working seamlessly into the lyrics. Unlike the lament of the opening track, "Solo Modelo" is surprisingly upbeat. There's Convertino's snappy rhythm, Koskinen's bubbly melody line, Barbara Jean

Myers' backing vocals intoning "Walking away" as the song ends, and the irresistible rhyme of the title. Sometime tourmate Pieta Brown joins Foucault on the chorus of the gentle "Monterey Rain," a more inscrutable tune with lines like "In a hotel room with a bible and a phone book. The good news and the bad luck. I said, 'One is going to answer,' you said, 'Jesus got my number I don't know how," suggesting that this too could be about Conway. Heywood provides the high and lonesome, while Morphine's Dana Colley brings the soul on his bass saxophone.

"Nightshift" turns the touring life into the much less romantic daily grind. "Drive all day, play all night, caffeine, nicotine, Jim Beam, alright. Get up in the morning and we do it again," he sings as Koskinen's Knopfler-esque guitar wails behind him. He tries, but doesn't quite convince us it isn't the best job ever. Sergio Mendoza, leader of the "indie mambo" Orkestra Mendoza from Tucson, lends Latin vibes to the first love nostalgia of "Sometimes Love." His spirited accordion is a perfect counterpoint to Heywood's languorous pedal steel. The title track pulls back, way back, from the personal nature of the rest of the record to the, for lack of a better word, universal. It may sound like something akin to existential dread, but the "Universal Fire" was very real. In 2008 a three-alarm fire swept across the backlot of Universal Studios. The King Kong Encounter attraction was destroyed, but the real tragedy wasn't known until 2019 when a New York Times exposé discovered it had also taken between 118 and 175 thousand master tapes. While it's debatable that Blink 182 constitutes a loss, there is no doubt that "Satchmo and The Killer and Sun Ra... Bo Diddley Big Mama and John Lee" does. But like the rest of the tracks on the record, "Universal Fire" deals with loss by turning it into a great song.

# The Creeps

It sounded like a musical saw had joined us when the funny little whining sounds began emanating from the ground beneath our chairs. Chris and I were attending a recent folk festival in a lakeside park after sunset when my ankles started burning. Putting 2 and 2 and 2 together, I realized that it was a conflagration of teenage girl mosquitoes. They were wearing sparkly cowboy hats and screaming out the words to Taylor Swift's Mirrorball through rose-colored proboscises. It made me want to weep, so I packed up and ran to my car for a feverishly itchy drive home with an ear worm to keep me company.

Folk music is an evocative art form. Six-legged cold-blooded exoskeletal creatures who crawl in three or four dimensions and may have at least one set of wings are powerful muses for emotional gut reactions in humans. Naturally, there exists a diverse and moving bug collection of folk music. The Eagles said it best, 'There ain't no way to hide your compound eyes.'

Our warm-hearted cold-hardy North American neighbors know all about insects. Anyone who has ever gone camping in the Canadian forest or paddled the Boundary Waters knows about the black flies. Each fly is as tiny as a gnat, but like door-busting shoppers at T.J.Maxx on Black Friday, they can form ten-foot-high swarms. A black fly is a hearty biter and salts its food with blood thinners and anesthetics leaving the bite-ee with rivulets of blood streaming down any body parts not coated in bear grease and mud. The swarms along the Little Abitibi River were the inspiration behind Wade Hemsworth's 1949 classic, The Blackfly Song:

And the black flies, the little black flies Always the black fly no matter where you go

I'll die with the black fly a-pickin' my bones

In North Ontar-eye-o-eye-o, In North Ontar-eye-o

This song was further enhanced with visuals in the animated short film by Christopher Hinton set to Hemsworth's classic. (Thanks to Dan for enlightening me about this song, and reminding me why I won't ever, ever go canoe-camping in Canada).

You don't need to go to Northern Canada to be inspired by our arthropodal brethren. Della Mae is an award-winning all-female bluegrass band out of Boston. National Champion fiddler Kimber Ludiker was driven to write the tune 'No See Um Stomp' by the hundreds of biting gnats she experienced at the beach when she was attending Mike Block String Camp in Vero Beach, Florida. She says of the tune, the first part is the swarm, the second part is the agony.

Leeches on the shelf, cicadas in the bin, supper's ready everybody come on in! Bugs mark the turning of the seasons, get into the seasonings, and give us the blues. Take the traditional American tune, Boll Weevil:

Boll Weevil told the farmer, you'd better treat me right

I'll eat up all of your cotton, sleep in your granary tonight

Boll Weevil told the farmer, you need no Ford machine

I'll eat up all of your cotton, can't buy no gasoline

This song is perhaps best known by recordings from Huddie Ledbetter and Woody Guthrie. North Carolina Fiddler Tommy Jarrell recorded this song in 1971 with his fiddle in a brutal DDAD tuning that encapsulated the ruin of Southern farmers over the destruction of their crops from these beetles. Luckily for them, there is an organic solution to the problem; fire ants are natural predators of the boll weevil.

String instruments are particularly suited to bug music. Fiddle tune Bumble Bee in a jug collected from Kentucky fiddler George Lee Hawkins and recorded by John Hartford sounds like its title, particularly in the tune's B part. Fly Around My Pretty Little Miss is another dance-worthy fiddle tune about a man's love for a pretty lady who can do-si-do gracefully with a tenfoot-high swarm of black flies. To hear a toe-tapping version of this dance tune, listen to Ole Belle Reed's rendition (link in the Discography).

Although not insects, spiders also deserve a mention because they have eight legs and FANGS. Who needs wings when you can terrorize humans by dangling from an invisible hair in a crowded bus stop. The other day I was playing a quiet set of jigs on the mandolin when I saw an orb spider descend from the ceiling. It landed on the table in front of me and scrabbled up close to where I was sitting. I kept playing and the spider remained, shuffling under sheet music, rappelling down the tablecloth, returning to the edge of the table. It appeared to be very curious about the music, as if the vibrations of the mandolin were like the feel of a picnic beetle struggling in a web. It attempted to climb up my pant leg only once. When I relocated it back to the table where I could keep an eve on it, I saw it roll six or seven of its own at me. Not wanting to push my luck, I didn't play any Beatles songs that day.
